# Purpose and Process of Critical Review

> Ensure new work and draft standards align with Codex strategic priorities.

#### **Review** based on:

- Mandate and strategic plan of Codex.
- Availability of scientific advice.
- Timelines's and procedural compliance.



#### **Executive Committee** (CCEXEC) responsibilities:

- Monitor progress of draft standards.
- Recommend actions (extension, cancellation, reassignment)
- Assess and advise on new work proposals.

# **Regional Highlights – Africa (CCAFRICA25)**

### > New Work Proposals

✓ Approved to advance:

Regional standard for braised or boiled, salted and unsalted, dried fish  $\rightarrow$  forwarded to CAC48.

✓ Deferred for improvement:

**Tiacry** (precooked cereal vegetable granules)  $\rightarrow$  to be **revised and resubmitted** at CCAFRICA26.

**Observation**: A notable appetite in Africa for initiating new Codex work items, but the quality of submissions is still limited by weak application of Codex work prioritization criteria.

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Partnerships and Harmonization - Strong emphasis on enhancing collaboration between Codex and the African Organization for Standardization (ARSO).

- ✓ Members highlighted the need for:
  - Multi-sectoral coordination mechanisms
  - Data sharing across food safety institutions
  - Strengthening food control systems

Food Hygiene and Street Foods - Members welcomed CXG 103-2024 (hygiene in traditional markets).

- ✓ Call to revise regional guidelines for street-vended foods (CXG 22R-1997) to:
  - Ensure consistency with updated international texts
  - Identify gaps and opportunities for revision





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#### Critical Capacity Gap

- Many members struggle to apply the Codex Guidelines on Work Prioritization (commodity criteria) effectively.
- Recommendation: Practical training is urgently needed to strengthen proposal quality and regional participation in Codex standard development.

#### Codex Strategic Plan Implementation

- ✓ Members supported ongoing implementation of the 2020–2025 Strategic Plan, while preparing for the new plan.
- A physical in-session working group identified new potential activities aligned with the upcoming Codex strategic plan.
- > Leadership Transition: to appoint Gambia as new Coordinator for Africa

#### **Approved New Work Proposals**

#### Galip Nut (Papua New Guinea-led)



- Rationale: Important for Pacific Island Countries (PICs) in terms of nutrition, food security, and trade.
- ✓ Risks Addressed: Associated with aflatoxins and allergens, but existing Codex texts (e.g. CXC 59-2005, CXS 1-1985) are sufficient to manage these.
- Procedural Compliance: Proposal fully met Codex criteria; no need for additional scientific advice.
- ✓ Next Steps: EWG established (PNG Chair, NZ & Vanuatu Co-chairs); to prepare draft standard for Step 3 consideration at CCNASWP18.



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#### **Approved New Work Proposals**

#### > Breadfruit Flour (Samoa-led)

- Rationale: Breadfruit is a climate-resilient staple. Converting it into flour addresses perishability, reduces waste, and supports trade.
- Market Potential: Recognized as a gluten-free product with high commercial interest.
- Procedural Compliance: Meets Codex new work and commodity standard criteria; no new scientific advice needed.
- Next Steps: EWG led by Samoa (co-chaired by Australia & Fiji) to continue data collection and draft preparation.

# CCFFV23 – Key Findings & Strategic Insights

## **Standards Progressed to CAC**

#### Fresh Dates (Step 8)

- Finalized after resolving debate on moisture content.
- 1% decay tolerance retained; EU reservation noted.

#### Fresh Curry Leaves (Step 5/8)

- Awaiting endorsement of food additives and labelling by CCFA and CCFL.
- In line with Codex procedural requirements.



# CCFFV23 – Key Findings & Strategic Insights

# **New Work Proposals Approved**

## Fresh Turmeric (Fiji)

- Enhances food security and trade.
- No scientific advice required.

### • Fresh Broccoli (Mexico)

- Revised to meet Codex format and strategy criteria.
- Differentiation from frozen broccoli emphasized.



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# CCFFV23 – Key Findings & Strategic Insights

### Review of Existing Standards

- Alignment of existing FFV standards to FFV layout only. Substantive changes deferred to future work.
- EWG re-established for layout harmonization.

# Mentorship & Capacity Building

- Need for actionable mentorship mechanism recognized.
  Includes twinning programs to support leadership by less active Members.
- Request to CAC for Codex to lead facilitation efforts.



# Strategic Reflections & Future of CCFFV

- Consideration of virtual or correspondence-based future sessions.
- Fresh dates case shows Codex's ability to build consensus.
- Emphasis on clear product definitions (e.g., fresh vs frozen broccoli).
- Codex must balance inclusivity, clarity, and technical rigor.
