



ACTION PLAN OF THE ARAB CODEX INITIATIVE

February – June 2026

In Coordination with the Codex Committee for the Near East (CCNE) and the Arab Industrial Development, Standardization and Mining Organization (AIDSMO)

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1. Introduction

This Action Plan is prepared in line with the Regional Action Plan¹ adopted by the Codex Coordinating Committee for the Near East for the period 2026–2027 during its Twelfth Session (CCNE12), particularly with regard to Strategic Goals 1, 2, and 4 of the Codex Strategic Plan 2026–2031. It also forms part of the follow-up to the implementation of the Arab Codex Initiative², a capacity-building project implemented by the Global Food Regulatory Science Society (GFoRSS) in partnership with the Arab Industrial Development, Standardization and Mining Organization (AIDSMO), reflecting the Parties shared commitment to operationalizing regional priorities and enhancing coordinated and effective participation in Codex work.

This Plan, developed under the framework of the Arab Codex Initiative, in coordination with the Secretariat of the Codex Coordinating Committee for the Near East (CCNE) and AIDSMO, aims to establish a methodological approach for identifying regional priorities, clarify follow-up responsibilities, and define the implementation actions to be undertaken during the first half of 2026 in relation to Codex activities. This includes preparation for an effective participation in relevant Codex technical committees, support for the development of regional positions, and the strengthening of capacity-building efforts and coordination among Member Countries.

The Plan focuses on the period from February to June 2026, as a key implementation phase preceding the Forty-Ninth Session of the Codex Alimentarius Commission (CAC49). It seeks to ensure alignment between regional activities and the adopted Action Plan and to promote a structured, transparent, and priority-based approach that supports the Region's effective and impactful contribution to the Codex Alimentarius system.

During its Twelfth Session (CCNE12), the Codex Coordinating Committee for the Near East agreed to establish an Electronic Working Group, chaired by the Lebanese Republic, with the State of Libya serving as Co-Chair, to monitor progress in the implementation of the Regional Action Plan, prioritize activities, and make any necessary revisions.

In this context, the Arab Codex Initiative will provide the Electronic Working Group with updates on progress made in implementing the Action Plan. This Support will facilitate the follow-up mandate and the preparation of reports submitted to the Secretariat of CCNE.

This mechanism ensures a structured, transparent and priority-based approach that supports the region's effective and influential contribution to the Codex Alimentarius system.

2. Main Tasks

2.1 Follow-up on Codex activities

- Follow-up on Codex calendar events, including committee sessions and relevant working group meetings, to ensure continuous awareness of emerging developments and updates.
- Monitor Codex documents, including working papers, meeting reports and circular letters.
- Disseminate relevant updates and documents to stakeholders in the region, ensuring that Member Countries and stakeholders are informed of priority issues in a timely manner.

2.2 Preparation for meetings of Codex committees

- Identify priority Codex technical committees.
- Identify priority agenda items for each Codex committee session, taking into account the region's interests and technical and regulatory needs.
- Provide template and guidance documents explaining, but not limited to, methodologies for analyzing the Codex committee's agenda items, in order to support systematic assessment and the preparation of technical contributions.
- Preparation of preparatory notes and technical analysis on priority agenda items prior to meetings, for use at both national and regional coordination level.
- Support the organization of coordination meetings of Codex Contact Points (CCPs) in the Arab countries and in the Near East region, to be held prior to committees sessions, in order to present technical analyses and discussing and proposing aligned positions.
- Contribute, as appropriate, to the coordination of regional positions, where appropriate, by supporting the preparation of conference room documents (CRDs) and oral intervention proposals, thereby enhancing coordinated and effective participation of Member Countries.
- Strengthen systematic coordination with industry representatives and private sector stakeholders, as appropriate, to support the exchange of relevant information and the understanding of the practical and operational dimensions of agenda items.
- Support the organization of interregional coordination activities in cooperation with other Codex regional coordinating committees on topics of common interest, thereby contributing to the exchange of experiences, promoting coherence in positions and supporting effective participation in the work of Codex technical committees.

2.3 Capacity-building Activities

- Organize training courses and workshops addressing topics related to Codex work, in response to the priorities of the region, that support the exchange of experiences and the strengthening of a shared understanding among concerned entities and stakeholders, including scientific, regulatory, and procedural aspects.
- Promote the participation of national experts and relevant national and regional stakeholders in Codex related capacity-building activities.

2.4 Reports and Recommendations

- Prepare post-meeting reports summarizing the discussions, decisions adopted, and their implications for the region.
- Provide technical and organizational observations and recommendations on issues related to the implementation of Codex Alimentarius to support decision-making and follow-up at the regional level.
- Support follow-up and evaluation mechanisms to ensure consistency between the implemented activities and the Action Plan adopted by the region.

3. The framework for determining the priorities of Codex committees and their agenda items

3.1 Objective of the framework

This framework aims to assess and determine the priorities of Codex committees and their agenda items by focusing on aspects related to public health, food safety and quality, as well as regulatory and trade considerations of relevance to Arab countries and the countries of the Near East Region.

This framework is designed to support evidence-based decision-making grounded in sound scientific methodology in determining the Codex committees and agenda items to be prioritized for consideration and follow-up by the Arab Codex Initiative. It thereby ensures that efforts are aligned with the Region's identified needs, priorities, and capacities.

With regard to the proposed plan for the first half of 2026, and as presented in **Table (1)** below, all Codex committees scheduled to convene during this period are considered priority committees, based on the reasons outlined in the table.

** The Codex Committee on Fish and Fishery Products (CCFFP37) will meet by correspondence between **07 April and 08 May 2026**. Any activities related to the work of this Committee will be agreed upon at the regional level, in accordance with the Region's needs and priorities and based on consultations among Member Countries.

3.2 Methodology and Approach

The framework is based on a quantitative assessment of the committees/agenda items, by awarding a score for each item based on three main criteria, according to the guiding questions associated with each criterion. This approach is applied to each agenda item of the Committee concerned.

3.3 Assessment criteria

- **Importance to public health and food safety**

To what extent does this agenda item contribute to improving public health, reducing health risks, or enhancing food safety?

- **Regional impact on the Arab countries and the Near East region**

Does the agenda item have a direct or indirect impact on Arab countries and the Near East region, including prevailing dietary practices, region-specific risks, or regulatory and trade implications, taking into account the importance of the commodity in regional production or consumption, potential challenges in complying with the proposed requirements and limits and their possible implications for market access and intra-regional and international trade, as well as the item's relevance to traditional products or commodities of a specific regional nature?

- **Feasibility and capacity-building**

To what extent is it possible to implement the outputs of this item at the level of the Arab countries and the Near East region? Does this require significant resources, specialized training or additional technical and institutional capacities?

3.4 Scoring System

The significance of each criterion is assessed using a scale from 1 to 3, as follows:

- (1) **Low:** The item has very limited significance or impact in relation to the specified standard.
- (2) **Medium:** The item has an average significance or effect in relation to the specified standard, requiring follow-up without a high priority.
- (3) **High:** The item has high importance or impact in relation to the specified standard and is a clear priority for the region.

The total scores resulting from the three criteria are used as a guiding tool to support the prioritization process, taking into account the overall context of the committee concerned and the nature of the items under evaluation (**Annex 1**).

4. Implementation mechanism of the action plan

Following the completion of the prioritization process at the committee level, the formation of specialized Working Groups will be established. This will be initiated through an official invitation to nominate members by the National Codex Contacts Points in the Arab countries and in the Near East region.

Nominated members shall be experts in the relevant technical field, whether they are members of the relevant national committees, representatives of the private sector with relevant experience, or academics and researchers.

An independent working group shall be established for each of the targeted Codex committees, which will follow up and address the identified priorities within its scope of competence.

Each country may nominate one or more members to each working group according to the needs and the nature of the committee concerned. Given that the different working groups will work in parallel during the same period, it is advisable to nominate different experts for each working group to ensure efficiency, continuity of work and effective follow-up.

These working groups shall be established by a formal decision of the Near East region Coordination Committee (CCNE), based on the proposal submitted by the National Codex Contacts Points.

These Working Groups shall be tasked with:

- Analyzing the results of the quantitative assessment to identify priorities and agree on priority agenda items.
- Conducting the necessary technical and regulatory analyses of the relevant agenda items.
- Preparing the technical documents and presentations in support of regional coordination meetings.
- Proposing national and regional positions where appropriate.
- Following up on the work of the Electronic Working Groups (EWGs) established under the relevant Codex committees.
- Monitoring Circular Letters (CLs) issued by the Codex Secretariat.
- Following up on calls for data submission according to the scope of each committee.

The working groups shall operate under the joint supervision of the Global Food Regulatory Science Society (**GForSS**) and the Secretariat of the Codex Coordinating Committee for the Near East (**CCNE**). Two facilitators shall be appointed for each working group, one designated by GForSS and the other by the CCNE Secretariat team, to undertake coordination and follow-up tasks and ensure the effective conduct of the working group's activities.

5. Timeline for 2026

This section sets out the proposed timetable (**Table 2**) for the implementation of the work plan activities during the first half of 2026, including the proposed milestones and coordination meetings. This table aims to support systematic planning, ensure effective coordination among stakeholders and track progress in the implementation of activities within the specified time frames.

The meetings will be held by default via the Zoom platform, provided that the Near East Coordination Committee secretariat, in cooperation with the GForSS Operations Group and in coordination with the Arab Codex Initiative Secretariat, will send a separate invitation to each meeting, with the agenda attached, including the link to virtual attendance, with simultaneous interpretation from Arabic to English when needed.

6. Proposed capacity-building activities

As part of the implementation of this plan, it is proposed to organize capacity-building activities aimed at supporting the effective and coordinated participation of Member Countries in Codex Alimentarius (**Table 3**). These activities would include the development of electronic courses (e-courses) divided into substantive sessions covering, but not limited to, methodologies for analyzing agenda items, identifying priorities and developing national and regional positions. This would also include guidance on the formation and composition of national delegations, tailored to the specific nature and mandate of each committee.

These activities can be programmed and implemented in the form of interactive webinars, ensuring flexibility and broad participation. It is also proposed to organize specialized workshops in risk analysis and data management, dealing with the relevant scientific and regulatory aspects. Such workshops would support technical capacity-building and enhance the readiness of Member Countries to contribute effectively to the work of the relevant Codex committees.

The proposed framework also encourages the submission of new ideas and initiatives addressing technical and regulatory challenges related to Codex work, which may be proposed by Member Countries and participating experts. This framework provides a structured mechanism for discussion and evaluation of such proposals in terms of their alignment with regional priorities, with the possibility of organizing dedicated sessions or events under the umbrella of the Coordinating Committee for the near East region (CCNE), in cooperation with the Global Food Regulatory Science Society (GFORSS), contributing to the promotion of innovation, exchange of expertise, and responsiveness to emerging challenges.

Annex 1: Detailed methodology for assessing and prioritizing Codex Committees and their agenda items

1. Introduction

This annex aims to present the detailed methodology adopted for prioritizing Codex committees and their agenda items, as applied within the framework of the Arab Codex Initiative, supporting a systematic and transparent approach in line with the Regional Plan of the Codex Coordinating Committee for the Near East (CCNE).

This annex serves as a technical reference document used by regional working groups and national Codex Contact Points when:

- Assessing and identifying priority committees
- Evaluating agenda items
- Identifying priority items

This methodology applies to all Codex committees, with practical application of the guiding questions adapted according to the nature of each committee (commodity-specific or general topics), without prejudice to the overall assessment framework.

2. Stages of Prioritization Methodology

Phase 1: Initial review of agenda items

All items on the agenda of the Committee concerned shall be reviewed as contained in the official documents of the session, including:

- Working papers
- Supporting documents
- Related addenda and appendices (Conference Room Documents – CRDs)

Phase 2: Quantitative Assessment Using a Scoring Matrix

Selected items are evaluated using the quantitative assessment matrix according to the three criteria adopted:

Phase 3: Compile results and determine the priority level

Following the assessment of items by the national Codex focal points and the award of scores according to the approved criteria, the average score for each item is calculated at the regional level, and this average is used as a guiding tool to classify items into the following priority categories:
