2 WHY THIS WORKSHOP, AND WHY NOW

Food and agri-food policy touches consumer protection, public health, employment, trade, investment, entrepreneurship, and market access. Indonesia therefore requires food regulation that protects health and consumer rights while giving responsible businesses enough regulatory certainty to invest, bring new products and technologies to market, and compete fairly.

Bappenas places this discussion within national development priorities and WNPG XII. BPOM brings the regulatory perspective, with attention to science-based and risk-based decisions, predictable procedures, fair treatment, sound evidence, and competent regulatory administration.



Regulation ready for new products and technologies is not deregulation. It requires stronger evidence, better risk assessment, greater predictability, and stronger regulatory competence.
